# HIV Services Prioritization

- Purpose of this process:
  - To provide information about HIV services in San Mateo County
  - To receive community and board input on the prioritization of Ryan White funded Core and Support services

# HIV Services Prioritization

## Core Services:

- **Early Intervention Services:** linkage to, and re-engagement in, medical care
- **Medical Case Management:** social workers
- **Mental Health Services:** psychiatrist, therapist, individual and group counseling
- **Oral Health:** dentist, dental services
- **Outpatient/Ambulatory Health Services:** primary care, doctors, nurses, medical treatment, lab tests



# HIV Services Prioritization

## Support Services:

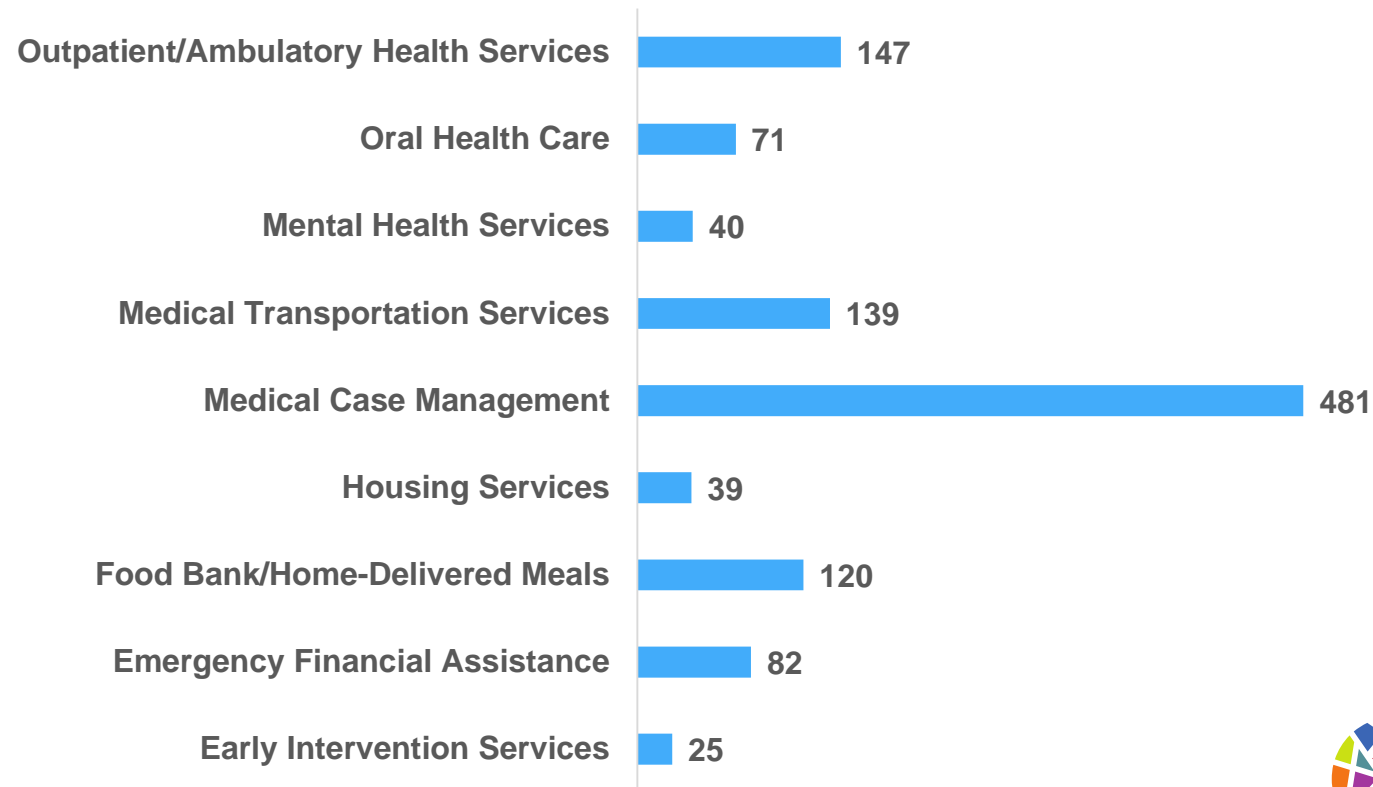
- **Emergency Financial Assistance:** utilities, unexpected bills, rental assistance
- **Food Bank/Home-Delivered Meals:** bags of groceries, food distribution/delivery, grocery vouchers
- **Housing Services:** emergency housing, motel, short-term rental
- **Medical Transportation Services:** taxi vouchers, samTrans tickets and Redi-Wheels vouchers

Unduplicated Client Count of Ryan White Service Utilization

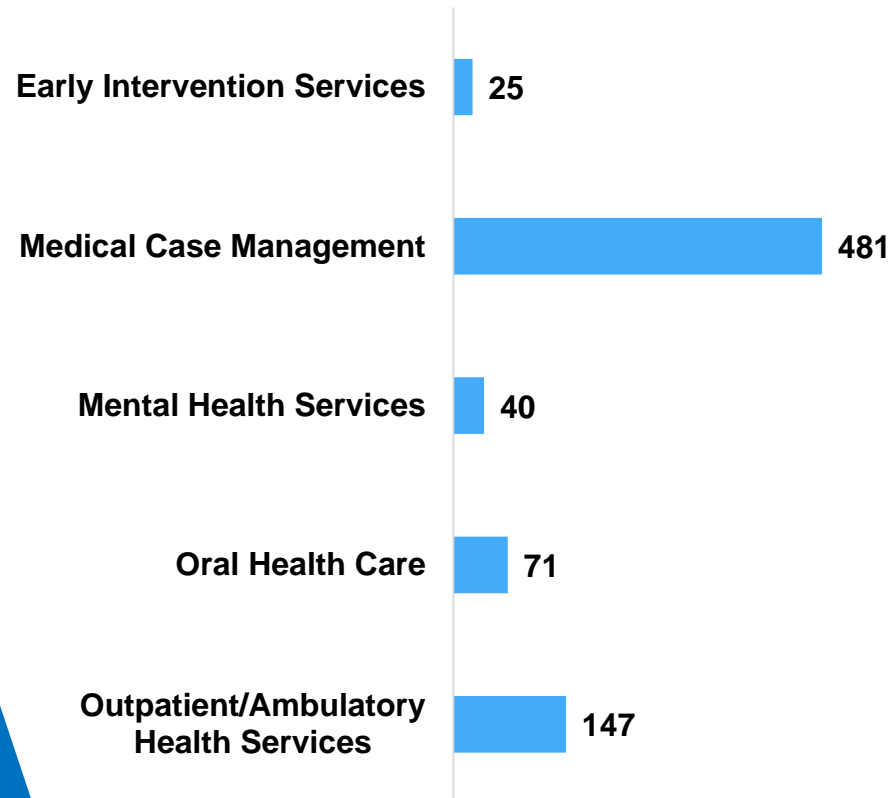
March 1, 2018 – February 28, 2019



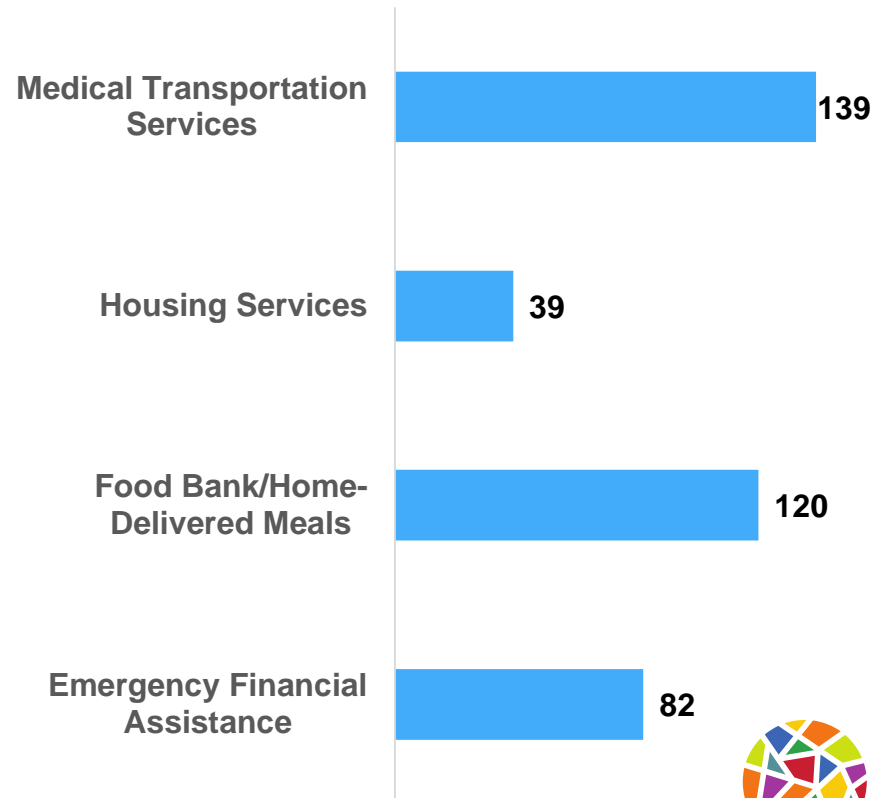

# Positive Happenings!

- Increased ability to provide linkage to care and re-engagement in care through collaboration with STD Surveillance
- Fewer patients needing Ryan White funded Outpatient/Ambulatory Health Services and Oral Health due to Medi-Cal expansion
- Increased ability to provide Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) referrals through collaboration with STD Surveillance
- Increase in Ryan White Part A funding of \$124,711 for 2019-2020
- 90% of clients receiving a Ryan White funded service have an undetectable viral load!



# Challenges

- Decrease in Ryan White Part A of \$783,711 (38.2%) since 2011-2012
  - 2011-2012: \$2,051,640
  - 2012-2013: \$1,641,628
  - 2013-2014: \$1,358,915
  - 2014-2015: \$1,183,453
  - 2015-2016: \$1,183,460
  - 2016-2017: \$1,179,267
  - 2017-2018: \$1,176,303
  - 2018-2019: \$1,143,218
  - 2019-2020: \$1,267,929
- Continued high cost of housing in Bay Area
- Loss of agency providing harm reduction counseling
