Presentation	Topic: Adult Abuse Prevention - Adult Protective Services (APS) is the official program in San Mateo County designated to receive and investigate reports of suspected abuse (neglect, abandonment, isolation, abduction, physical, sexual, mental and/or financial exploitation) and develop care plans for, seniors or dependent adults. The past couple of years have seen a spike of cases being investigated and abuse allegations. Back in the 90's, the group was investigating only 20+ cases a month; with no outreach as there was only one social worker. Presently, with mandated reporting (and may be due to increase in aging group population and people getting savvier), 8 social workers and a deputy public guardian are investigating about 100 a month (with 130 in January!). Interestingly, 30% of the cases involve financial abuse, as well as a high percentage of self-neglect. As of June 2013, reported misappropriated amount (cumulative) is \$3MM. The impact to the county is being analyzed and will be in a report shortly. The grand jury review of 2013 recommended increase in outreach and for a more robust operation. Anyone (not just mandated reporters) can make a referral to APS at any time to 1-800-675-8437; for abuse in care facilities, call 650-780-5707.  The Q&A was very informative, particularly reiterating the significance of estate planning and (limited) power of attorney, evaluated every 5-7 years.	Presenter: Chris Rodriguez, Manager, APS

	<ul> <li>State budget was announced last Friday; analysis of actual impact on aging programs will be reported shortly. Federal budget for Older Americans Act programs, is mostly frozen. – The one exception is the funding for a White House Conference on Aging that was cut. A conference may still occur but the event was not funded. The overtime and travel time that was to be instituted for IHSS providers is on hold based till January 15<sup>th</sup> per a court decision. There will be a court hearing on Jan. 14<sup>th</sup> to decide if implementation will occur. There is a new timesheet based on hours worked (previous timesheet was based on decimals). Training is being provided on the new timesheet as the change will be confusing initially. There is also a new form for mileage reimbursement (copy distributed); on line form is automated. Mileage to be charged is for full attendance to committee and standing committees only. Rate went up to \$0.575. Submission is time-sensitive; no retroactive reimbursements after 3 months, however, monthly submission is strongly encouraged.
