Core Services:

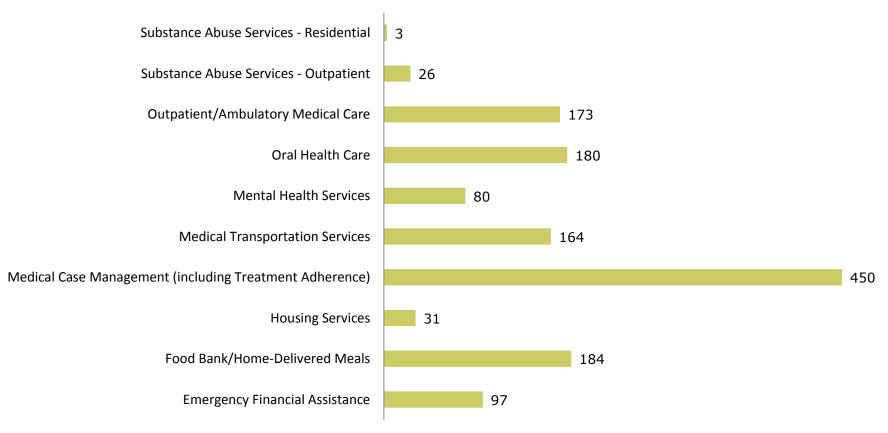
- Medical Case Management: social workers
- Mental Health Services: psychiatrist, therapist, individual and group harm reduction
- □ Oral Health/Dental Care: dentist, dental services
- Outpatient/Ambulatory Care: primary care, doctors, nurses, medical treatment, lab tests

Support Services:

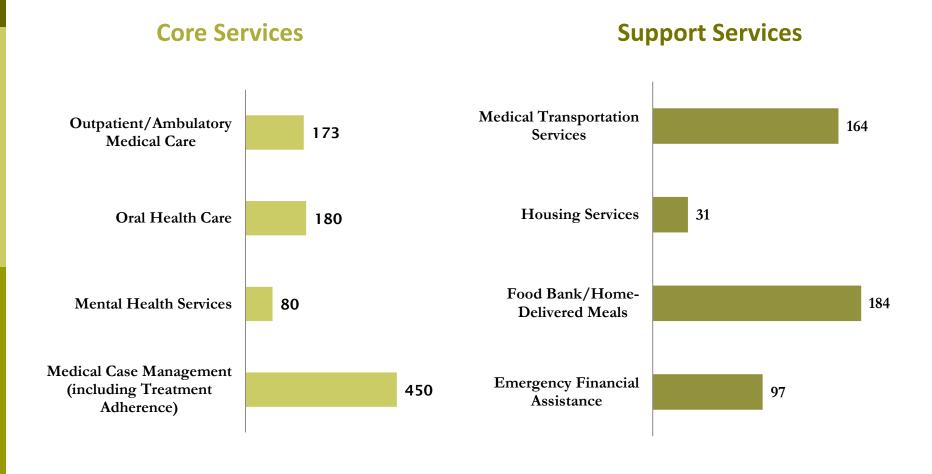
- Emergency Financial Assistance: utilities, unexpected bills, car repair
- □ Food Program: bags of groceries, food distribution/delivery, grocery vouchers
- Housing Services: emergency housing, motel, shortterm rental
- Outreach/Transportation: medical transportation services, mostly taxi vouchers, some samTrans, CalTrain

Positive Changes

- Expected increase in revenue due to more patients being eligible for Medi-Cal
 - As of January 1, 2014, patients who were on LIHP/MCE transitioned to Medi-Cal
 - Medi-Cal reimbursement is higher than the LIHP/MCE reimbursement
 - Far fewer patients require Ryan White funded Outpatient/Ambulatory Care due to having another payor source

Challenges

- Expected decrease in Ryan White Part A of \$156,275 (11.5%) as of March 1, 2014
 - Already received decrease of \$692,726 (34%) over past 2 years
- Expected decrease in HOPWA of \$11,515 (1.5%) as of July 1, 2014
 - Already received decrease of \$125,726 (14.3%) over past 2 years
