YMHFA Update



YMHFA Annual Update

Since October 2013,

2,432 individuals completed the training

1,775 school and school-related staff

Of school staff who participated in 6-month follow up,

92.2%

more confident to recognize the signs that a young person may be dealing with a mental health/substance use challenge or crisis.


Of school staff who participated in 6-month follow up,

92.5%

more confident to assist a young person who may be dealing with a mental health/substance use challenge or crisis in seeking professional help

WHO LEARNS/TEACHES

<u>Participants</u>: Teens in **grades 10-12** or **ages 15-18.**

<u>Hosts</u>: High schools, organizations partnering with a high school and youth-serving organizations

WHAT IT COVERS

Signs of mental health and substance use challenges and crisis

Impact of school violence and bullying on mental health

How to talk to friends about mental health and substance use challenges.

How to seek the help of a responsible and trusted adult

HOW DELIVERED

<u>In-Person</u>: Six 45-minute sessions or three 90-minute sessions

<u>Blended</u>: Teens complete a selfpaced online lesson, then participate in six live, instructorled sessions (video conference or in-person)

tMHFA Requirements

- ☐ Safety protocol in place, including responding to teens at risk of suicide and exit ticket process
- ☐ 10% of staff at the site trained in YMHFA
- ☐ Teach entire grade level (at school) and entire group of students (at youth-serving organization/program)
- ☐ 5-30 teens classroom taught on non-consecutive days
- ☐ Mental health professionals in the classroom
- ☐ Inform parents/guardians, staff and teens, including info sessions and letters to families
