### **Core Services:**


- Early Intervention Services: linkage to, and reengagement in, medical care
- Medical Case Management: social workers
- Mental Health Services: psychiatrist, therapist, individual and group counseling
- Oral Health: dentist, dental services
- Outpatient/Ambulatory Health Services: primary care, doctors, nurses, medical treatment, lab tests



### **Support Services**:

- Emergency Financial Assistance: utilities, unexpected bills, rental assistance
- Food Bank/Home-Delivered Meals: bags of groceries, food distribution/delivery, grocery vouchers
- Housing Services: emergency housing, motel, short-term rental
- Medical Transportation Services: taxi vouchers, samTrans tickets and Redi-Wheels vouchers






#### Unduplicated client count by Core and Support Services

## Updates

- Our Ryan White Part A allocation for 2023-2024 is \$1,451,409. This is an increase of \$9,084. We are adding \$9000 to Food Bank/Home Delivered Meals
- We received an increase in our HOPWA funding for 2023-2024 of \$46,391. We passed 97% of that increase to the Community Based Organization.
- Edison Clinic began providing mpox vaccines in August 2022
- Prevention team administered 28 doses mpox vaccine at San Mateo Pride on June 10<sup>th</sup>
- Continue to see an increase in new patients at Edison Clinic; 35 from April to June 2023
- 94% of clients receiving a Ryan White funded service have an undetectable viral load!
