

Cash Position and Forecast




Cash flow challenges & opportunities

Payment Collection Performance


- Cash inflow from paid claims for patient services continues to be above target

Patient Accounts Receivable Performance


Patient Accounts Receivable Performance

HPSM Assignments




2025 Highlight










Patient Experience: Percentage of patients who answered affirmatively to the patient experience survey question: "Did the staff work together to meet your needs?" Higher is better.

Access to Care




Assigned and Engaged: Percentage of patients assigned to SMMC by the Health Plan of San Mateo who are actively engaged in Care. **Higher is better.**






Revenue Per Member, Per Month: Total patient revenue divided by total number of assigned members. Higher is better.

WORKSHOP FOCUS	SMMC is committed to ensuring that all patients screened for cervical cancer receive their results and follow up care and/or treatment for abnormal results effectively in a timely manner. This requires coordination across our healthcare system. We want to ensure that each part of our organization that performs cervical cancer screening and treatment is supported to use Epic workflows to provide our patients with optimal, timely care.		

SMMC Improvement System Continues to Accelerate

The SMMC Improvement System continues to focus on the most important challenges facing our patients and staff. This includes work deeply connected to our Epic implementation and work that is focused on other workflows. Teams are moving forward on work focused on a variety of areas including: the management of referrals, tracking of pap smears, communication between Resource Management and Patient Financial Services and team-based management of Hypertension. As we do this work, we continue to learn more about the improvement processes themselves and are working to improve our improvement system as well. We look forward to keeping the board apprised as more improvement work moves forward.

SMMC Continues to Progress through Epic Implementation

SMMC continues to stabilize its operations as it moves toward optimization within our Epic implementation. As stated above, there is work at all levels of the organization to ensure staff are getting the support they need to use the system as effectively as possible. Although we are only 5 months into our use of Epic, we are already preparing for our first upgrade. Epic releases upgrades at least 4 times a year and recommends that organizations take at least two each year to ensure they are staying up to date and providing their staff with the most streamlined tools available. HIT and SMMC Design Teams are currently working to prepare for the upgrade which is scheduled for May 11th. It will require a minimum of downtime and is not expected to require additional staff training. My thanks to everyone who is helping us prepare for this important next step.

Baby Bonus Income Program Launches for Birthing Parents

Family Health Services and other partners have started participating in San Mateo County's Baby Bonus program, which was first introduced at the 2023 Ending Childhood Poverty Summit. After months of collaborative planning involving key partners — First 5, Health Plan of San Mateo, County Health (Family Health Services), Stanford University, Human Services Agency and the Jackie Speier Foundation — the landmark initiative launched the week of March 24th.

Coordinated by First5, the program will provide a \$300 monthly cash gift to approximately 400 birthing parents over a span of 36 months. The goal is to evaluate how such financial support, combined with intensive care coordination and improved system integration, can impact new families. Community health workers from the Health Plan of San Mateo will coordinate care. Family Health Services oversees WIC nutrition/breast feeding support provided to families and nurse home visiting. Key outcomes will focus on improving health care utilization, increasing parental workforce participation and household income, supporting parental mental health and fostering healthy child development. The program also aims to strengthen positive parent-child relationships.

The Baby Bonus is available to San Mateo County residents who have Medi-Cal funded births. On March 26, 2025, the first participant in the Baby Bonus program was officially enrolled.

County Health Participates in Regional Preparedness Exercise

Staff from Emergency Medical Services and public information officers from County Health joined law, fire and medical first responders for an active-shooter training scenario at Oracle Park in San Francisco. In a mass-casualty incident, Emergency Medical Services coordinates ambulance transport for patients to receiving hospitals and trauma centers and manages requests for additional medical resources. Public information officers assist with press announcements, support for family reunification activities and the sharing of information among agencies.



The exercise provided tactical training for personnel from the City and County of San Francisco and San Mateo County. Community volunteers and life-like dummies portrayed wounded victims.

Utilizing federal homeland security grant funds, the event was hosted by the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI), a regional program focused on enhancing emergency preparedness, disaster response and security across the San Francisco Bay Area.

Supervisors Recognize National Public Health Week

County Health was proud to receive a proclamation from the Board of Supervisors in recognition of National Public Health Week. Director of Public Health, Policy and Planning Tamarra Jones, Director of Family Health Services Lizelle Lirio de Luna and Director of Environmental Health Services Heather Forshey spoke about the work of their divisions to combat communicable disease and collect data about population health, provide vaccination guidance and support families with newborns and inspect restaurants and prevent foodborne illness.
