The Riese decision has held that "absent a judicial determination of incompetence, antipsychotic drugs may not be administered to involuntarily committed mental patients in non-emergency situations without their informed consent."		
Antipsychotic medications may be administered if an emergency situation exists. An emergency situation exists when there is either: (1) a clear and present danger to self, or (2) a clear and present danger to others. Such medication may be continued until it is determined the patient is no longer an immediate danger to self or others. Repeated attempts to obtain patient's consent for medication should be made.
