CLINICAL PEARL

COVID-19 and the brain: Although COVID-19 is considered to be primarily a respiratory disease, SARS-CoV-2 affects multiple organ systems. <u>A recent study</u> showed that SARS-CoV-2 infection can be associated with neurological and neuropsychiatric illness, ranging from encephalopathy with delirium/psychosis, inflammatory CNS syndromes including encephalitis and acute disseminated encephalomyelitis, to ischemic strokes associated with a pro-thrombic state and peripheral neurological disorders such as Guillain-Barré syndrome and brachial plexopathy. Some of the cases but not all responded to immunotherapy. <u>In another study</u>, 62% of the patients with complete data sets presented with a cerebrovascular event. Of these, 74% had an ischemic stroke, 12% an intracerebral hemorrhage, and 1% CNS vasculitis. 31% of the patients with complete data sets presented with altered mental status, including encephalopathy or encephalitis as well as neuropsychiatric disorders: i.e. new-onset psychosis, neurocognitive (dementia-like) syndromes and affective disorders.

Researchers in San Diego have shown that <u>SARS-CoV-2 can infect neurons in organoids</u> (miniaturized clumps of brain tissue, made by coaxing human pluripotent stem cells to differentiate into neurons), killing some and reducing the formation of synapses between them. Using human organoids, mouse brains and some human post-mortem examinations, <u>work by Yale immunologists</u> seems to confirm that the virus can infect the brain. However, questions remain over how the virus might reach people's brains. Because loss of smell is a common symptom of COVID-19, many think that the olfactory nerve might provide a route of entry but so far, the evidence does not support this theory.

<u>Another preprint</u> described post mortems in 67 people who had died of COVID-19. While electron microscope studies did reveal the presence of the virus in the brain, virus levels were low and were not consistently detectable. In fact, despite their high sensitivity, RT-PCR tests often do not detect the virus in brain tissue and several studies have failed to find any virus particles in cerebrospinal fluid. One reason might be that the ACE2 receptor, which the virus uses to gain entry, is not expressed much in brain cells. Although other viruses do invade and infect the brain, and while there is clear evidence that SARS-CoV-2 can infect neurons, it is not clear whether SARS-CoV-2 does so to a significant extent. The neurological symptoms exhibited by patients might instead be the result of an overstimulated immune system. Because this may not be true in all cases and because these two scenarios require entirely different treatments, biomarkers that can reliably distinguish between a viral brain infection and immune hyperactivity are clearly needed.
