CLINICAL PEARL

The search for a snake bite antidote could lead to a new treatment for COVID-19: Snakebites kill nearly 140,000 individuals a year, mostly in impoverished rural areas of Asia and Africa, which lack the proper medical infrastructure and knowledge to administer antidotes. A major problem is the approximately two hours it takes on average for a snakebite victim to get to a hospital and begin treatment. Venom is a mixture of enzymes that immediately begins to destroy cells, making prompt treatment essential to prevent tissue loss and save lives. Since the early 1900s, the antidote has been made by injecting horses or other animals with diluted poison extracted from snakes. The immune system of animals generates antibodies for several months; then blood plasma is extracted from them, from which the antibodies are taken. Ophirex, Inc. is a public-benefit corporation committed to raising awareness about snakebites and developing the world's first small molecule therapeutics for snakebites that can be administered orally.


The search for this small molecule inhibitor started by selecting which venom enzyme should be blocked. Several variants of secreted phospholipases A₂ (sPLA₂s) are common in snake venoms. **Varespladib** (LY315920), a <u>clinically-tested synthetic molecule</u> was found to block inflammatory cascades at <u>nanomolar and</u> <u>picomolar concentrations</u> against 28 medically important snake venoms from six continents. **Varespladib was** jointly developed by Eli Lilly and Shionogi, a Japanese pharmaceutical company, as a possible treatment for sepsis and acute coronary syndrome but was never commercialized. Because inflammation of the lungs caused by COVID-19 also produces sPLA2, Ophirex's Phospholipase A2 Inhibitor will be tested in oral and injectable formulations for treatment of SARS-CoV-2 under the direction of the U.S. Army Medical Material Development Activity (USAMMDA).
