This program, ACE (Affordable Care for Everyone) provides coverage that is usually better than the sliding fee discount program. There is no intrinsic relationship between the two, so it is not unusual for the value received from the local indigent care program (ACE) would be significantly higher than the total of sliding fee discounts.
