MHSA Update

MHSA is the 1% tax that we have in California (Prop 63) that passed in 2004 that has provided dedicated funding for mental health services. We serve individuals with mental health challenges and we also have 50% of that funding goes to Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) which is what I am here to talk about today.

As the manager, I oversee and facilitate the planning process for this funding. We are required to submit a plan every three years for how we will spend the dollars. We just completed a three-year planning process the end of this past summer and it was pretty comprehensive. The plan came to the commission and was open to a 30-day public comment and it was approved and moved forward with the acknowledgement that we work on one area of the plan a little more and that was the PEI for ages 0-25.

Today is an amendment to that plan that we will be submitting to the state and today we will be opening a vote for a 30-day public comment period recommendation. We started a taskforce this past October – December, it was three two hour meetings that involved leaders, experts, community, family members, and clients. The committee really worked to develop strategies around areas such as: youth mental health crisis for prevention, juvenile justice involved transition aged youth, early identification treatment for children 0-5, school and community connectedness, and substance use and mental health evidence based program.

To come up with proposals for areas we strategized around which of these areas were high readiness and high impact and need based on data. Out of these areas the one we can move forward immediately after this 30-day public comment is the Youth Crisis Prevention and Support.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Heath Information Exchange (HIE)

San Mateo County is going to launch their new Health Information Exchange, SMC Connected Care, which will be used for the electronic sharing of health-related information for patients and clients receiving services from the San Mateo County Health System.

All BHRS clients are automatically included in the Health Information Exchange and will receive a letter this month, which will allow them to "opt out" if they prefer that their information not be shared in this new system (except in the case of an emergency).

The initial launch is expected in March for San Mateo Medical Center, Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, Aging and Adult Services, Family Health Services, Public Health Policy and Planning and the Mobile Clinic. Contracted agencies will not initially have access to SMC Connected Care, however, plans are in the works to include them.

Adult System of Care – How to Access Services

BHRS Access Call Center

Presented by: Selma Mangrum, Clinical Services Manager I

BHRS Access Call Center:

- Entry point for referrals for Mental Health and Substance-Use Treatment for San Mateo County residents with qualifying insurance.
- 24-hour access
- Use of interpretation line to assure language capability
- Information and referral to community services or private insurers
- Welcome calls from individuals and providers to call to request a service referral or obtain information about service eligibility

Screening and Referrals:

• Clients are screened over the phone by a licensed clinician for medical necessity and appropriate level of care for referral.

Same Day Assistance

Community members seeking mental health services:

- Access Call Center referred or self-referred (walk-in)
- Meet with a licensed /licensed eligible clinician
- Receives
 - Needs assessment
 - Medication evaluation (on current medications)
- Gets connected to mental health and/or AOD provider
 - o Primary care
 - Community based organizations
 - Private provider network
 - Regional care (specialty mental health services)

Regional Clinic Services: Specialty Mental Health Eligibility:

- Diagnosed with a serious mental illness or dually diagnosed
- Experiencing severe functional impairment
- Without private insurance
- Residents of San Mateo County

Clinic Services:

- Medication support
- Care coordination
- Group and individual psychotherapy
- Case management
- Rehabilitation services
- Crisis intervention

Community Support Services:

- Lived Experience Social Support Services
- NAMI

Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Presented by Terry Wilcox-Rittgers, Clinical Services Manager

Primary Care Interface

The Primary Care Interface Team provides brief counseling, case management, MAT (Medicated Assisted Treatment) and psychiatric consultation to patients who habe been

referred by their primary care provider. The primary care provider must be from SMMC or one of its satellite clinics. Interface staff are embedded in the clinics and work collaboratively with primary care to provide integrated treatment.

Clinic Sites

- Daly City Health Center, Daly City Youth Health Center (Case Management only)
- South San Francisco Health Clinic, San Mateo Medical Center (Youth only)
- Fair Oaks Health Center, Sequoia Teen Clinic

Services

Children, youth, and adults are referred for various concerns such as: depression, anxiety, panic disorder, drugs and alcohol abuse, ADHD, etc.

Treatment is voluntary and ranges from 1 to 8 sessions.

We provide:

- Individual Counseling and Family Therapy
- Psychiatric Consultation
- Collaboration with the clients primary care doctor
- Alcohol and other Drug Assessment, Case Management, and MAT
- Parenting Support Group and Adolescent Teen Group
- Linkage and community referrals: Pre-3, Access Team, Private Provider Network, and Human Services Agencies

Consumer Voice: Embedded in the System Via OCFA

- Grievance process
- Management/Leadership
- Support for Peer Support Workers
- Co-supervise Family Partners (youth)
- Monitor Peer run organizations
- Stipend management for peers and family members

- California Clubhouse
- Heart & Soul
- The Mouton Center

Housing Support Continuum Presented by Diane Dworkin, Clinical Services Manager

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

- Formerly Shelter Plus Care
- Must be disabled and chronically homeless
- Prioritization for individuals with the highest vulnerability and needs

- Recipients matched to permanent housing and ongoing case management services
- No time limit

Housing Readiness Program (HRP)

- Homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness
- Five year rental assistance voucher
- Case management from a county or community based program
- · Able to achieve financial self-sufficiency in the five years

Moving to Work Program (MTW)

- Five year self-sufficiency program
- Open to the general public-online application
- Random lottery selection
- No supportive services

HIP Housing (Human Investment Program)

- Home sharing program
- Homeowners who have a residence are matched with individuals seeking housing
- Screening and support provided by HIP Housing
- No time limit

Board and Care Homes - Assisted Living Facilities

- Non-medical homes or facilities that provide room, meals, housekeeping, supervision, storage and distribution of medication, and some personal care assistance
- Operated under the supervision and regulation of Community Care Licensing
